Yearly Recap

In 2023, MARS admitted 937 patients in total, ranging from small Hummingbirds to Black-tailed Deer. This admission number decreased 16% from 2022, as there continued to be a heavy presence of Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza (HPAI) in the area.

...Cont'd Yearly Recap


Wildlife came to us from all over Vancouver Island, and even from the Sunshine Coast and the Greater Vancouver Area. Just over 4% of our total intake were transfers from other rehabilitation centres, including Island Wildlife Conservancy on Salt Spring Island, and PROWLS in Powell River.

Inflation has been a large issue again this last year, with the cost of supplies rising and donations decreasing. This continues to strain our operating budget as we struggle to keep our patients fed and purchase necessities like disinfectants and cleaning material.





Intake By Region



MARS continues to admit and treat redlisted (endangered) and blue-listed (threatened) species, as well as species of special concern, at a total of 68 individuals across 20 different species.




Most Common Avian Patients of 2023









Reasons for Intake (Human Causes)

Patient Admissions

2023 saw a major increase in cat attacks as a reason for wildlife admission, followed closely by impacts from vehicles and impacts on windows. These were the leading causes for admissions for all species.

... Cont'd Patient Admissions

Animal populations are still struggling with plenty of diseases, the worst of these was the return of HPAI, which greatly decimated bird populations and affected multiple species of birds including waterfowl, raptors and corvids.

We believe this is the main reason for the greatly reduced admission numbers in 2023. HPAI affects not only the healthy adult birds, but also asymptomatic carriers who appear to have a lower rate of successful broods.



Ambassador Update

- In 2023, WildARC, in Victoria, sent us a juvenile Common Raven in need of intensive rehabilitation due to her injuries.
- After a number of months this bird was deemed unreleasable by veterinarians due to her poor eyesight, thought to be the result of a congenital disease.
- While in our care, rehabilitators noticed her docile behaviour and incredible curiosity towards humans. Staff thought that she would be an excellent fit for our ambassador program. She was given the name "Kora" and became an ambassador in early 2024.






